- Ministry of Education and Culture: <u>Policies to promote internationalisation in Finnish higher education and research 2017–2025</u>




- Talent Boost joint cross-sectoral programme for the Government aiming to make Finland more attractive to international talents

- Finnish Government programme 2019: <u>Inclusive and competent Finland</u>

Tuition fees for non-EU/EEA students in HE

- Tuition fees for non-EU/EEA students were introduced in 2017
 - Minimum tuition fee 1500 EUR per year. HEIs to determine the fees they apply for each study programme.
 - The fees vary between 2 000 18 000 EUR
- Scholarship programmes are mandatory. Typically scholarships in form of fee waivers (partial or full)


Foreign full degree students in Finnish higher education institutions





Effects of introducing tuition fees to non-EU/EEA students


Newly enrolled foreign students in Finnish HEIs




Between 2016 – 2017, number of new non-EU/EEA students dropped by 35 %

Number of new EU/EEA students increased by 30 %

Employment of foreign students after graduation




Finnish full degree students abroad – growing but not well known

57 % come back to Finland in 1-5 years after graduation (survey 2008) Credit mobility of higher education students from/to Finland (over 3 months)



Various reasons behind declining student mobility

Cuts in HEI resources and staff

New funding model of HEIs will not reward from credit mobility

No mobility windows in the majority of degree programmes

Focus of international activities elsewhere (student recruitment and educational export)

Lack of resources for counselling of potential mobile students

Cuts in students financial aid, economic constraints

Pressure to graduate fast

Demography:

1/3 of new HEI students

over 24-years of age,

16 % have children,

over 50 % work

Many ways to gain international experience
