We want all children staying at the facility to feel safe, including among their peers.
The following rules have been created precisely so that you and your peers feel respected and accepted here. No matter how old you are, whether you are a boy or a girl, or what country you come from.

Always worth it



1. When you meet or pass by a colleague, say hello or smile.
2. Try to always use the words: „please”, „thank you” and „sorry”.
3. If you see someone who is sad or crying, come up and ask how you can help.
4. Always think of others and address them with respect, even if they look and behave differently from you.
5. Your colleagues are from different countries and may have different customs and ways of relating. Ask how they would like to be addressed or greeted.
6. When a colleague speaks or behaves in a way you don't like, tell him or her and ask not to do it.
7. If you don't understand another person's behaviour, or it seems strange or scary to you, talk about it with an adult you trust.
8. When someone says no, respect that and don't do what they don't want to do.
9. React if you see a colleague being harmed and report it to your parents or a staff worker at the facility or another adult you trust.
10. Remember, no one has the right to insult you, call you names, ridicule you, humiliate you, shake you, push you, hit you, or do other things you don't agree with. Always report such situations to your parents or another trustworthy adult at the facility. You have the right to feel safe.



Never do that



1. Do not ridicule, abuse, insult or humiliate others. This also applies to comments and messages on the web.
2. Don't hit, push, pull, or use any physical violence against your colleagues.
3. Don't criticise or slander others, even if someone's behaviour seems ridiculous or strange to you.
4. Don't take anyone's belongings (e.g. phone, clothes, toys, cosmetics, etc.).
5. Don't record or publish conversations, videos, or photos involving other children, if they do not give their consent.
6. Don't form alliances and don't get involved with groups of children who collude against others, teasing, ridiculing, or bullying others. If you know of such groups or feel you are being bullied you absolutely must report it to an adult you trust.
