13:25 – 14:10 - I Panel – Tax revolution. How the OECD has redesigned international tax system? What does it mean for Poland, Hungary and Republic of Korea?

The debate would be divided into two parts. It would kick off directly with the most recent and significant tax reform that the OECD is responsible for: the Two-Pillar Solution to Address the Tax Challenges Arising from the Digitalization of the Economy. Firstly, the discussion would concentrate on the latest details of the widely accepted OECD's Inclusive Framework agreement. Countries would take the floor to express their views on the deal and hopes related to both pillars. The B4 representative could present MNEs' point of view on the proposal. The second part would concentrate on the future. What are states' expectations regarding international tax reforms? Are there any more gaps to be filled? Are we heading towards global taxes? What more could be done in order to reach competitive yet just tax systems?

Poland, Hungary and Republic of Korea will face multiple economic, social, technological and political challenges in a post-pandemic world. To achieve sustainable growth and improve people's living conditions, a two-pronged approach is needed - in public policy and in the private sector.
